INDICATOR GUIDE

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1. OVERVIEW OF THE PROGRAMME INTERVENTION LOGIC

This chapter summarizes the intervention logic of the Programme and briefly explains the relationship between the Programme's Objectives, Types of Actions, projects and indicators. The results of the implementation of the projects within each Objective are measured through indicators. The selected set of indicators, thus, aims to measure and quantify the impact of the Programme and its financed projects on the region and its inhabitants.

The Programme is structured along three Priorities with five Objectives:

Priority 1: A resilient and green border region

- 1.1 Climate change adaptation, risk prevention
- 1.2 Biodiversity and reduced pollution

Priority 2: A healthy and attractive border region

- 2.1 Equal access to health care
- 2.2 Culture and tourism

Priority 3: A cooperating region

- 3.1 Harmonious neighbourly relations through cooperation
- 3.2. A safer and more secure Europe

Under each Objective a number of typical actions (Types of Actions) have been outlined. The typical actions are meant to provide an orientation framework for the implementation of the programme, especially to outline the objectives and preferred activities of the Calls for Proposals. Thus, Types of Actions are meant as a tool for organizing diverse activities into a system showing logical progression towards achieving the Programme's Objectives.

Under each Type of Actions corresponding possibly implementable activities (Possible activities) are listed, compiled on the basis of the identified challenges and needs of the region. List of activities are indicative and is meant to orientate the calls for projects in the implementation phase, linking the projects to the needs and challenges specific to the border region, ensuring that the submitted project proposals are well-targeted interventions designed to address and solve the diagnosed problems.

By implementing projects that fit to the framework of the Types of Actions, including to any or more indicative activities, it is expected that the objectives of the programme are promoted. In order to be considered for financing, the submitted **projects must clearly correspond to one Objective of the Programme, however, may fit to more than one of the Types of Actions** under the same Objective.

Please consult the *Guidelines for applicants* for the list of Type of Actions per Objectives in frame of which Large-scale Projects may be implemented. Matching to the dedicated ToA is an obligation for an LSP project, however, can match with other(s), too.

Indicators selected for the Programme

The Programme decided by the usage of common indicators for ERDF-funded Programmes, with emphasis on using common indicators for ETC programmes, whenever it is possible, reflecting the strong focus of the Programme on enhancing the cooperation in the region. Thus, **predominantly ETC common indicators were selected, together with a small number of common ERDF indicators**, these latter ones in order to tackle the thematic impact of some investments in infrastructure and equipment foreseen in the Programme. The selected common indicators are able to measure practically all outputs of the Programme, so that no need for any programme-specific indicator have been emerged at output level.

At the level of results, **two Programme-specific indicators have been identified** and are used, to measure the results of some actions with investment in infrastructure under Priority 1. New, Programme-specific indicators have been designed to reflect on the large variety of possible topics to be addressed by the projects of the Programme that cannot be sufficiently well measured by any of the available common indicators. The Programme-specific indicators integrate the results of the projects implemented in various thematic fields, ensuring that they're more achievable/attributionable and their relevancy is much stronger than any of the common ERDF indicators.

Indicators to be selected by the projects

As a general rule, projects are expected to directly contribute to at least one Programme-level output and one Programme-level result indicator, selected for the relevant Objective.

In most of the cases, there is **a direct link between the output and result indicators**, so that projects contributing to the value of any of the output indicators, are expected to contribute to the value of the corresponding result indicator, too. (See table below, indicators marked with * are tied to the indicator next to them).

The associated indicators must remain paired up, which means that the (paired) result indicator is preselected and mandatory. In that case, a pre-determined result indicator is automatically assigned based on the selection of its output indicator-pair.

Exceptions are the following output indicators, because for those there is no matching result indicator:

- RCO115 Public events across borders jointly organised
- RCO81 Participations in joint actions across borders

The indicators are to be selected based on their relevance for the planned activities and objectives of the project. The projects can choose the output indicator from all the indicators available under the Objective. Nevertheless, attention shall be paid to obligatory indicators by certain Objectives, as follows:

Each project must correspond with the following indicators by all Objectives:

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The schedule and timing for measuring the indicator values is also predetermined and clearly defined in Chapter 2. Accordingly, the selected output indicators are measured upon the finalisation of the project, the measuring of result indicators is diverse (during project implementation / at project completion / up to one year after project completion).

Information for the result indicators will be mostly extracted from the Follow-up reports of the supported projects, accompanied by on-site monitoring activities and specific surveys in case it is needed to acquire accurate and reliable data.

The indicator counts the number of solutions identified for resolving/ alleviating such legal or administrative obstacles across borders within the remit of the type of action in the programme area.</p> <p>Legal or administrative obstacles are shall be identified on the basis of an appropriate analysis of the territorial context, which provides meaningful inputs on the functioning legal and administrative frameworks. The identified solution(s) should be customised according to the specificities of the territories covered and to the cooperation context. In order to be counted in the indicator, an identified solution should be accompanied by indications of possible actions to be taken for its potential implementation.</p>	
<u>Rationale for selection</u>	The indicator captures predominantly the outputs of the Type of Actions 2.1.1.: Creation of the legislative, administrative and technical framework for common epidemiological measures and the cross-border rescue services. The foreseen actions are expected explicitly to address solutions to cooperation obstacles in the field of epidemiology and the operation of the border rescue services.
